VETS/ VOICE Andy Catton hopes to crown his liford's hat-trick of wins in the Brugge Grand Prix with a world title on the course in '96

NDY CATTON has won the last three 10km veterans' road races at the prestigious Brugge Grand Prix, but will be doing extremely well to make it four in a row next June when the event incorporates the World Vets' Road Championships.

The Ilford runner has always

been a force on the road and his powers, when fully fit, show no signs of diminishing, as was evident in the 1995 Brugge

"This year's race was the hardest of my three wins, without a doubt," said Catton. "There was a large-group for most of the race, then just three most of the race, then just three of us battling it out with 300 metres to go. I found there was more quality this year.

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"I will be back with a large group next year to compete in the World Championships."
British runners have won the

last two events. Mike McLeod won at the NEC in 1992 while Nigel Gates won last year when the race was held in Toronto. The Brighton runner is likely to figure in Brugge next June, but Catton is the one with course

knowledge. Catton was disappointed with

his third place in this year's BVAF 10km at Coventry, which followed his Brugge victory. A repeat of his Brugge time (31:03), would have given him the title, but it was not to be and he had to settle for 32:00 and bronze.

Catton was inspired as a youngster by his father Jim, who was also a member of Ilford AC. Now 76, Catton senior won the Essex cross-country championship and was a regular rival of Jim Peters.

Catton junior repeated his father's Essex victory on more than one occasion and, in 1980 for instance, won with Graham Fell third and Eamonn Martin 12th. That year Catton went on to 17th in the Inter-Counties, 18th in the National, third fastest in the Southern 12-stage and the Essex 5000m in 14:06.

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Catton, a director in the insurance industry, has been Insurance AA 10km track champion 10 times. He said: "Veteran athletics has been a new lease of life, but much harder than I anticipated."

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If the long-time Ilford servant comes out on top in Brugge again next year, it may be everybody else who could justifiably repeat that claim.
